## LAND REVENDE ADMINISTRATION REPORT, PART I, FOR THE PRESIDENCY PROPER.

The following are the reports for the year 1907-1903 of the three divisions of the Presidency Proper. The' usual appendices are attached. Jamábandi returns Nos. 6 and 7 have not been appended to this report as they are now prepared decennialls.

## 2. Season.

## NORTHERN DIVISION.

2. The season was unfavourable, for the rainfall though copious, was neither timely nor well regulated. In the Gujarat Districts, a few unequally distributed showers fell in Juúe, and it was not till after the middle of July that the rain began ceasing again finally at the end of the first week in September.

In Thana the monsoon burst promisingly, but the extraordinarily heary and continous downpour at the end of July retarded transplantation. The October rains failed completely, and the effect on the crops was disastrous.

Most of the early somn seeds came to nought and the land had to be ${ }^{\circ}$ resown while the later sown seeds were, in many places, washed away by the heavy rain in July and August. In Ahmedabad, Kaira and the Panch Maháls the kharif crops were scarcely worth talking about, while all unirrigated rice and most of the bijri failed completely. In. Broach and Surat, however, the season was somewhat more favourable, for, in both districts, the jowari and cotton crops struggled through and yielded from a fair to normal outturn. Wheat in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Surat yielded a fair to normal crop. Cotton generally failed in Ahmedabad but was estimated at 8 annas in Kaira and at from 9 to 12 annas in Broach and Surat where it fetched high prices. In Thána early rice yielded an 8 to 10 anoa crop, while the late sown variety gave an outturn of 6 to 8 annas.

Water-8upply.-As the rainfall was abundant, the water-supply in tank and wells was ample everywhere, except, perhaps, to some extent in Tháa.

Plague.-Plague appeared in a milder form than before in Ahmedabad, Surat and Kaira, but in the last named district it accounted for 1,879 deaths. In Broach it was confined to a few villages of Jambusar Táluka, while in the Panch Maháls it appeared in Kálol and Hálol only. In the Thána District the plague mortality decreased from 773 to 667 . Váda was infected for the first time in the history of plague but the deaths numbered only 7.

Cholera.-In the Thána District there were 67 deaths from chólera. No cases occurred in any other district.

Cattle Disease.-Rinderpest which prevailed practically throughout the division carried off about 2,000 cattle in Kaira; 1,374 in Ahmedabad; 657 in Broach and 1,095 in Thána. The mortality in the Panch Maháls has not been reported but cases occurred in Kálol, Hálol and Jhálod. The services of the Veterinary Graduate were utilized in Alımedabad in checking the epidemic, and 126 cattle were inoculated in the Viramgám Taluka.

There was a slight attack of Hæmorrhagic Septicæmia in the Olpad Táluka of the Surat District.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

The advent of the monsoon was marked by a heary fall of rain in July and August in almost all districts of this division, but kharif crops, which promised well in the beginning, yielded only a fair harvest orving to excess of moisture.

The rainfall was generally scanty for rabi crops. The heavy early rains were good for sowing operations, but the later rains held off and the rabi crops were every where poor. The water-supply was generalíy sufficient. Plague was prevalent in Poona, East Khándesb, West Khándesh and Sátára, being most virulent in the tálukas of Wâlwa (Sátára) and Táloda (West Kbándesh). In Wálwa Táluka alone the mortality was 11,000 . In the other districts, the mortality was trifling. Cholera prevailed in the districts of East Khándesh and Sátára, but the mortality was insignificant. Cattle-diseases prevailed in the districts of West Khándesh, Poona and Sátára; but except in Poona where rinderpest caused heavy loss of cattle the outbreak was mild.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

As stated in the Land Revenue Administration Report, Part II, the monsoon set in rather late in June, and abundant rains in July and August were followed by scanty rains in September and October, with the result that the kharif crops were poor to fair in the Karnatic and fair to good in Kánara and the Konkar. Want of sufficient rain in November affected the outturn of the rabi crops also. Excepting the facts that there was partial crop failure in the Bijápur and Indi Talukas and a considerable contraction of the area cropped in Bijápur and Dhárwár Districts, the season on the whole, however, may be said to be normal in the below-ghat and somewhat below normal in the above-ghat country. Locusts and wild elephants appeared in some parts of Kánara but did no damage to the crops. In some parts of Belgaum and Bijapur crops were more or less damaged by insects.

Fodder and water-supply were sufficient.
The condition of agricultural cattle was, on the whole, good, but in the northern part of Bijapur their number is reported to have gone down to an alarming extent. Tagái was, however, freely distributed to bona fide cultivators for purchase of bullocks, though it is probable that the poorness of the present season (1908-1909) may have made it difficult for cultivators to keep the cattle purchased.

The public bealth was good except for plague which was very bad in Belgaum. Means for inoculation were made available to the people but the results show that very little advantage was taken of the protection so offered.

## 3. Gross Revenue.

## (Column 6 of Appendix I.)

## NORTHERN DIVISION.

The gross revenue increased by Rs. 6,427, the Ahmedabad, Panch Maháls and Surat Districts reporting an increase over last year, and Kaira, Broach and Thána a decrease.

In Ahmedabad the assessment of bhata or river-bed lands which were formerly unassessed raised the gross revenue by nearly. Rs. 7,000, while the growth of revenue in Panch Mabáls is accounted for by the increase of assessment under the Kalol revision survey and by the assessment for, the first time of a certain area of kharabo. The last mentioned cause also operated in Surat though to a smaller extent.

On the other hand, the introduction of the revision settlement into the Broach Taluka lowered the assessment demand by Rs. 2,688, while in Thana the abatement of assessment on land set apart as woodland plots resulted in a loss of Rs. 3,986.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

As compared with the figures of the preceding year, there was a net decrease of Rs. 4,731, due chiefly to the abolition of patastial rates in

Ahmednagar and Poona Districts and to the appropriation of cultivable assessed land for public and special purposes in the districts of Ahmednagar, East Khándesh, Ẉest Khándesh, Násik and Sholápur.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The gross revenue, Rs. $1,06,39,629$, shows a net decrease of Rs. $\mathbf{3 , 4 8 3}$ made up as follows:-

The increase in Belgaum is explained as being chiefly due to judi in excess of assessment and dry crop lands converted into rice lands in the Sampgaon Táluka, while that in Kolába is due to the falling in of special leases.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs. 3,867 principally due to the following facts:-
(1) The Akluj-Dahigaon Deshmukhi Watan in the Sholapur District which had been resumed was regranted as inám.
(2) Revision survey settlement was introduced into certain inám villages in the districts of Ahmednagar, Násik and Sátára.
(3) Allowances payable to hakdars in Dumala villages which Lad been hitherto included in judi were excluded from that item and added to net alienations.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Under this head occurs a net increase of Rs. 4,383, mainly due to the fact that the enhancements in revision of the assessments of shetsanadi lands in the Dhárwár District were shown under judi last year, whereas now they are brought. under alienations as per Government Resolution No. 9585, dated 30th September 1907. Belgaum, Bijápur and Kolábas show slight decreases of Rs. 123, Rs. 115 and Rs. 101 respectively, the decrease in Belgaum being due to changes in the mamul judi on reneral of old sanads and lapse of inám lands to Government, and in Kolába to the operation of the orders about kadim cash allowances. In Ratnágiri there is an increase of Rs. 73, chiefly owing to the inclusion for the first time in the district accounts of the assessments of the village of Math Kurd, táluka Deogad, alienated to the Bavada State.

## 5. Net Government Revenue.

(Column 13 of Appendix I.) NORTHERN DIVISION.

The causes leading to the net increase of Rs. 12,202 in the revenue of the division are explained in the following table:-


CENTRAL DIVISION.
There was a net increase of Rs. 9,937 under this bead over the figures of the previous year. It is shared by the districts of East Khindesh, West Khándesh and Násik principally, and is mainly due-
(1) to much unassessed waste and forest land being assessed and given out for cultivation, and
(2) to the revision settlement in all districts exoept Almednagar and Sholapur.

The decreases are due in the Satára District to the forfeiture of occupied lands for non-payment of Government dues, in Ahmednagar and Poona Districts to the abolition of patasthal rates, and in Sholapur District to the alienation of the Akluj-Dabigaon Desbmukhi Watan.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The net ordinary fixed revenue shows a decrease of Rs. 8,975 over that of the preceding year. The decreases in the several districts are shown below:-

The decrease in Bijápur, Kánara and Kolába is due to relinquishments by occupants and forfeiture and entry as Government waste for non-payment of revenue. Increase in the revision assessment of shetsanadi lands wrongly shown under judi last year and now brought under ináms, forfeiture for arrears of land revenue and reduction of water-rates owing to deficiency in the watersupply explain the decrease in Dhárwár. In Ratnágiri a decrease of Rs. 322 occurs for the reason mentioned in paragraph 3 above.

## 6. Miscellaneous Revenue.

## (Column 16 of Appendix I.) ,

NORTHERN ${ }^{*}$ DIVISION.
The net increase of Rs. 23,810 under this head was made up as fol-lows:-


The decrease in Alhmedabad, Kaira, Panch Mabals and Surat occurred for the most part under authorized cultivation in unassessed land, unauthorized occupation of land, ground-rent, sale of grass and grazing and the produce of trees, notice fee and occasional items of fixed revenue.

For a large proportion of the increase in Thána the development of Sálsette Táluka must be considered to be responsible, the increase on account of altered assessment for the current and past years amounting to Rs. 54,171. The proceeds from the sale of the occupancy of land increased by Rs. 11,202 and from the sale of grazing by Rs. $1,9 \overline{9} 5$.

There was a net decrease of Rs. 61,482 under this head. It occurred principally under the following heads in the districts noted against each of them :-

Large sums were realized by the sale of occupancies of lands in almost all the districts except Kánara and particularly in Dhárwár where there were sales of lands to the Railway Company and to the public at Gadag and also of resumed Dharmayait lands at Ron, the proceeds of which were ordered by Government to be assigned to the Sanitary Committee for the maintenance of a water trough. Grass and grazing sales also fetched larger receipts than last year in Belgaum while in the neighbouring district of Dhárwar the receipts under this head fell, owing, it is reported, to a good orop of grass in private ands. There is an all round decrease under occasional items of fixed revenue
except in Ratnágiri. Fewer encroachments were brought to light in Bijápur than was the case in the previous year. Hence there is a decrease of Rs. 5,860 under unauthorized occupation for that district. The decrease against Kánara is wholiy due to the special increase of last year owing to the occupancy price recovered from Sapurlo Shetti on account of Railway lands in Bád village of Kárwár Táluka sold to bim, disappearing this year.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Remissions of current yenr's land revenue amounted to Ris. 1,01,763 agaiust Pos. 2,16,865 in 1906-1907. They were due to the following causes :-
(1) Introduction of revision survey-


The last mentioned item includes Rs. 1,410 in Ratnágiri on account of lands held rent-free in khoti villages for religious or charitable purposes (paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 6852 of 8th September 1901). Besides the above, Rs. 75,321 were remitted in Belgaum under rules 6 (I) and 6 (II) of the Suspension and Remission rules, on account of previous year's suspended arrears. The information on this point is not given by the other Collectors. The figures appear to have been included in column 21 (irrecoverable balances written off on account of former years). It is probable that the greater part of the large sums shown under this head in Bijápur and Dhárwár are due to this cause. The remissions under the rules in question in Belgaum have been put in the figures for column (21) so as to bring the figures for all the districts under the same head. The amount entered in this column for Ratnágiri is said to be on account of the management expenses of khoti villages lapsed to Government.

## 8. Suspensions. <br> (Columm 27 of Apperdix I.) NORTHERN DIVISION.

The net increase in suspensions due to failure of crops amounted to Rs. $21,44,819$.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

During the jear, suspensions were granted in all the districts, the total being Rs. $30,48,552$ against Rs. $1,27,826$ of the previous Jear. They were rendered necessary by the poor kharif and worse rabi crops and were based. in accordance with the standing rules on estimates of the crops. It will be seen that of the total uncollected balance at the end of the year, $\mathrm{S} G$ par cent. represented suspended revenue, and only Rs. $4,50,000$ was unauthorizedly in arrears. Of this latter sum, the largest am.unts were in Ahmednagar, Poona and Sitíira, the three districts which showed the heaviest unauthorized arrears in the previous years also. There were also large balances from former years in all other districts except East and West Khảndesh.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Suspensions on account of the failure of crops amounted to Rs. 4,12,201 against Rs. 96,287 of last year. They were granted in the Belgraum, Párasgad, Athni, Chikodi and Sampgaon T'alukas of the Belgaum District, Bijapur, Bágewádi, Indi and Sindgi Talukas of the Bijápur District and in parts of Navalgund Táluka of the Dhárwár District. In Kolába Rs. 1,041 were due to floods in the Panvel Táluka and Rs. 375 to fire elsewhere.

Rupees $9,24,171$ out of former years' suspended revenue were resuspended.

## 9. Revenue for Coilection.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

The amount for collection (after grauting remissions but without taking suspensions into account) for the year under report (column 19) shows an increase of Rs. 27,303 and that ou account of the years previous to 1907-1908 (column 22) a decrease of Rs. 29,36,917. The result (column 23) was a net decrease of about 29 lakbs.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The amount of revenue for collection on account of the jear under report was Rs. $88,80,721$ (column 19 ) as compared with Rs. $87,42,74 \overline{5}$ in the preceding year. The increase is accounted for partly by the reasons mentioned in paragraph 6 under miscellaneous revenue and partly by the fact of the large decrease in the amount of remissions granted in Dlairwar as compared with the preceding year. The past arrears after deducting irrecoverable amounts written off (column 21) were reduced from Rs. $38,52,058$ to Rs. $20,41,544$. The result was a net decrease in total revenue for collection of Rs. $16,7 \pm, 5 \mathrm{E} 5$ :

The large increase in column 21, irrecoverable balances of former years written off, is, as has been stated above, apparently due to the working in the three above-ghat districts of the rules sanctioned by Government Resolution No. 650 of 22nd January 1907, regarding remission of three years' old revenue. Excluding suspensions shown in columens 27 and 29 , the revenus for actual collection in the year under report was Rs. $95,85,573$ (Rs. 84,68,500 for current year + Rs. 11,17,373 for past years).

Of the current year's demand of Rs. $74,35,234^{\prime}$ (Rs. $96,15,057-R s .21,79,823$ $=$ Rs. $74,35,231$ ), Rs. $73,44,378$ were collected or $98 \cdot 77$ as compared with 98.28 in the preceding year.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

Out of the total revenue for collection (Rs. 1,60,08,820), a sum of Rs. $92,18,765$ was collected. Without omitting the amount suspended, the percentage of collection to demand was as detailed below:-

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Out of the actual demands for the year under report and former years as stated under head 9 , Rs. $82,75,200$ and Ks. $8,52,313$ or 97.7 and $76 \cdot 2$ per cent. respectively, were collected against $97 \cdot 6$ and $86 \cdot 7$, respectively, in 1906-1907. The total collections of the year amounted to Rs. $91,27,513$ on a demand of Rs: $95,85,873$ or $95 \because 2$ per cent. agaiust 95.5 per cent. of last year. ## NORTHERN DIVISION.

The serious failure of crops alluded to above necessitated the suspension of a large amount of assessment due for collection and the outstanding balance at the close of the year was Rs. $17,15,684$ in excess of the figures of the previous year. Appendix No. II shows that of the total outstanding balance of Rs. 29,27,968, some Rs. 3,26,607 are irrecoverable. For the bulk of the irrecoverable portion, that is to say, for about two and a half lakhs, the Kaira District is responsible; a portion of the amount has already been written off and the remainder will shortly be written off. Excluding previous years from consideration, the outstanding balance amounted to Rs. $22,70,679$, and the collection of Rs. 21,79,823 was formally suspended ; the unauthorised arrears of the year under report therefore amounted to Rs, 90,856 .

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

Appendix II shows the amounts of balances that remained outstanding on the 1st August 1908. Of the balances for collection, viz., Rs. $67,90,0{ }^{5} 5$ less than 23 per,cent. are estimated as irrecoverable. Column 6 of Appendix II includes amounts suspended with sanction.

Out of this, however, the unsuspended arrears were only Rs. $4,58,360$ or 4.2 per cent. of the amount set down for collection in the year against 3.7 per cent. of last year. For districts these percentages are as per margin. The remainder was either suspended or resuspended. Appendix II, column 8, will show that the Collectors estimate that out of unsuspended arrears only about Rs. 1,88,271 are irrecoverable. This is, however, a mere guess and, as stated by the Collector of Bijápur in his report, given a good year and practically the whole of these arrears will be paid in. The whole of the arrears in Kánara are unauthorized and most of them occur in Yellápur alone. The Collector explains that "certain lands bordering on or surrouaded by thick forests, and others which could not be cultivated owing to the malarious climate and paucity of tenants, remained uncultivated and recourse had to be had to coercive measures to recover the revenue. Several prakarns in which forfeitures have been ordered are still pending disposal and this accounts for the high figure of arrears. $\Delta$ greater part of the above sum is reported as likely to be recovered as shown in Return No. 3, the lands forfeited being sold by auction, when necessary, though on such occasions bidders are not always forthcoming."

The Kolába balances are trifling. In Ratnágiri, out of the total balance of Rs. 89,726 , Rs. 78,367 are on account of management expenses for khoti attached villages which will be recovered when the villages are released or written off when they lapse.

## 12.-Takavi Advances, Recoveries and Balances.

## NORTHERN DIVISION.

Advances made under the two Acts totalled Rs. 1,29,103 and Rs. 8,25,853 against Rs. 17,670 and Rs. 1,96,652, respectively, in the preceding year, an increase in the aggregate of Rs. 7,40,639.

The unfavourable season of course involved more than the ordinary amount of assistance to needy ryots.

Of the total amount outstanding under both Acts, viz., Rs. 33,36,575, Rs. $4,48,442$ were due in the year under report, Rs. $9,74,518$ representing arrears of past years. Of the former, Rs. 2,10,899 were collected and Rs. 3,735 written off as irrecoverable. Of the latter, Rus. 77,258 were collected and Rs. 7,435 written off.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The total amounts advanced during the year under report were.Rs. 1,20,413 under the Land Improvement Loans Act and Rs. 1,54,087 under the Agriculturists' Loans Act against Rs. 1,51,190 and Rs. 2,13,461, respectively, granted in 1906-1907 and Rs. $5,21,052$ and Rs. 5,56,580 in 1905-1906. The decrease, it will be noticed, occurs mostly in the above-glát districts where new transactions bave been greatly curtailed owing to the pressing necessity for a settlement of the large outstanding arrears of previous years, of which there were over 22 lákhs at the beginning and over 14 lákhs still outstanding at the end of the year under report. Rs. 11,121 out of the amounts advanced during the year were due for recovery in the same year. This sum, added to previous outstandings, brought the total amount due for collection under both the Acts to Rs. $22,34,280$ against Rs. $24,38,629$ and the collections amounted to Rs. $8,73,888$ against Rs. $9,13,962$. In all, 49,582 acres of unoccupied land were newly brought under cultivation as shown in the margin; while there were decreases in Násik, Poona and Sátára Districts on account of forfeitures and relinquishments as shown in the margin.

The large increase of cultivation in West Kbándesh (especially in Nandurbár and Pimpalner Táíukas) is satisfactory as indicating the opening out of the more remote part of the district.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The ares of assessed occupied land (column 12) fell off by 601 acres, though there was an increase in the Ratnágiri (775) and Dhárwár ( 1,041 ) Districts owing to unoccupied waste lands being newly brought under cultivation. The decreases in the Belgaum and Bijápur Districts were mainly due to forfeiture of 936 acres in the former and 2,761 acres in the latter, though in these в $528-5{ }^{-}$
districts, 887 and 1,612 acrea, respectively, were newly taken up for oultivation. Relinquishments account for the decrease in Kánara. In Kolába the decrease , seems to be nominal, being due to correction of figures wrongly shown as occupied in the last year's return. There is a large increase of 10,735 acres in Kánara under column 6 (Forests), while there is a corresponding decrease of 10,338 under column 7 (Land set apart for public purposes). There are similar variations in Kolába under columns 6 and 7. These variations have not been explained by the Collectors.

The large decrease of nearly 7 annas in the incidence on net cropped area in Belgaum is due to a more extensive cultivation of bájri and of cotton. In Dharwar less remissions being granted during the year, the revenue collected was larger than last year, while the net cropped area decreased by about 33,000 acres. The incidence therefore under columns 15 and 20 has increased appreciably. In Bijápur also the net cropped area decreased considerably, but there was a corresponding fall in the revenue demand and therefore there is only a slight variation in the incidences. In other places the variations are unimportant.

In Thána nine arrests were made under Section 157 of the Land Revenue Code, but, in every case, execution of the warrant resulted in the immediate payment of the sum due.

## CENTRAL DIVISION.

The number of notices issued under Section 152 (columin 3) decreased from 69,688 to 45,691 , that is, by about one-third, though there were slight increases in East and West Khándesh. Cases of penalty under Section 148 of the Land Revenue Code increased from 194 to 229 . The increase was greatest in Ahmednagar and Násik.

The number of persons proceeded against under Section 154 of the Land Revenue. Code fell from 1,882 to 821, that is, by about 56 per cent.

Notices for forfeiture under Section 153 fell from 6,755 to 4,309, that is, by about 36 per cent. This satisfactory decrease in the number of coercive processes is no doubt due to the liberality and promptitude with which suspensions were granted during the year.

## SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The number of notices issued under Section 152 was considerably less than in the preceding year, oiz., 13,672 against 19,521. The decrease occurred in all the districts except Ratnágiri and is most noticeable for Bijápur, Dhárwár and Kolába. This satisfactory result, the Collector of Bijapur says, was due
partly to the enforcement of the principle that notices need not be issued in cases where it is not proposed to employ compulsory processes. In Dhárwár it is ascribed to a favourable outturn of crops and in Kolába to promptness in recovering the revenue. On the other hand, penalty under Section 148 would appear to have been imposed more freely than before, there being 543 cases against 416. Recourse to this section appears necessary to meet cases of contumacy.

There was a decrease in the more serious forms of compulsion employed, viz., under Sections 154 and 153, the numbers of cases falling off from 334 and 349 to 27 ö and 323, respectively. Increase is noticeable, however, in the area of land declared forfeited-6,490 acres against 5,060 of the preceding year. Bijapur, Dbárwár and Kánara have contributed to this increase. The Collector of Bijápur remarks :-
"As a rule land was not ordered to be forfeited unless the parties concerned were reported to be wilful defaulters. The restricted tenure is viewed with considerable disfavour in this district; but I made it a rule to restore forfeited lands on that tenure when payment was made after order of forfeiture. But I had to revise my orders in some cases because it appeared that the payees had obtained the money on the security of the lands and this security would of course be destroyed by the alteration of the tenure".
For the Dharwar District it is reported that the " forfeiture related generally to cases several years old in which there was also no desire to retain the lands," while for Kánara it is mentioned that the "lands concerned bordered on forests and were unsuitable for cultivation."

## 16.-Miscellaneous Land Revenue not included in the Taleband. NORTHERN DIVISION.

There was an increase of Rs. 27,712 under this head. This was due chiefly to-
(1) the recovery of the capitalized value of the abatement of land revenue of the Railway C class lands (Government Resolution No. 518, dated the 9th February 1907, Public Works Department, Railway) and
(2) a contribution made by the District Local Board, Alumedabad, towards the cost of repairs to chowras in that district.

## LAND REVENUE ADMINIS'TRATION REPORT, PART I, SIND.

The following is the report for the year 1907-1998 of Sind. The usual appendices are attached. Jamábandi Returns Nos. 6 and 7 have not been appended to this report, as they are now prepared decennially.

## 2.-Season.

The year was one of the most unfavourable on record. The river rose late and remained at a low level during the greater portion of the inundation season. On the 1st July the Bukkur gange registered only 8 feet 9 inches. Nine feet were reached on the 5th idem. A height of 13 feet, which is considered a fair irrigational level for the province, was not reached till the 13th August and was maintained only up to the 23 rd of the same month, i.e., altogether for 11 days against 84 days in the previous year, 86 days in 1905-06 and 40 days in 1904-05. The result was a serious decrease in the cultivated area and revenue, the falling off in the former amounting to more than 6 lakks of acres and in latter to 20 lákhs of rupees. On the other hand, the rainfall was sufficient and there was a substantial rise in the area of cultivation in the Kohistan of the Karáchi District and the Desert tálukas of the Thar and Parkar District. In the latter tract, however, much of the rain was unseasonable and the outturn of the crops was seriously affected for want of a ferw timely showers.

The public health was on the whole good except for plague which ran its usual course in the town of Karáchi and made its appearance in the towns of Lárkána and Tatta and for cholera which broke out in parts of the Karáchi and Hyderabad Districts.

The condition of cattle was generally satisfactory, but, except in the Kohistan and Desert and in certain low-lying tracts, there was a great scarcity. of fodder. 'There was an outbreak of 'fluke' among buffaloes in the Tatta Táluka, and of rinderpest among cattle in Karáchi, resulting in a total mortality of 100. Two slight outbreaks of anthrax, which carried off 31 head of cattle, and one of Hæmorrhagic Septicænia in which 122 head of cattle died, occurred in the Sukkur District. .

## 3.-Gross Revenue.

## (Column 6 of Appendix I.)

The net increase of nearly 9 lakhs under this head is not of course due to any improvement in the amount of land revenue payable to Government, for, as already stated, the season was a most unfarourable one, but to the constant fluctuations which arise either from changes in the area of unoccupied cultivable land, assessed and unassessed, the revenue of which, calculated at an average rate deduced from the figures of the assessment of cultivated area is included in 'Gross Revenue', or from variations in this average rate. Thus in the year under report an increase of 6 lákhs took place in the Sukkur District owing to the correction of a mistake by which last year an area of 200,000 acres of cultivable area was wrongly classed as uncultivable in the accounts of the Rohri Taluka; and in the Thar and Parkar District there was an increase of $7 \frac{1}{2}$ lákhs on account of the enhancement under revised settlements of the assessment rates in the Umarkot and Pithoro Tálukas. The decreases of $3 \frac{1}{3}$ lákhs and $1 \frac{1}{4}$ lákhs occurring in the Hyderabad and Karáchi Districts respectively are attributable to a reduction in the average rate above referred to. This reduction again was.due to the fact that as the water-supply was insufficient more lightly assessed methods of irrigation were generally adopted.

## 4.-Alienations.

## (Column 9 of $\Delta$ ppendix I.)

Almost all the districts contribute to the small increase of Rs. 12,000 which occurs under this head and is due to a decrease of cultivation in the jághir areas, and a corresponding increase in the calculation of the amount of alienated revenue. In the Thar and Párkar District, a part of the increase is also accounted for by the recent revision of assessment rates in the Umarkot and Pithoro Tálukas.

## 5.-Net Government Revenue.

## (Column 13 of Apperdix I.)

The falling off of $19 \frac{1}{2}$ lakhs under this head is entirely the result of the low inundation of the year, which affected the water-supply of nearly every canal in the province, not even excepting the Jámráo Canal, which may be said to have really failed for the first time. The largest decreases are in the Lárkána, Hyderabad and I'bar and Párkar Districts.

The figures in column 13 are inclusive of halcabo (water rate) levied on alienated holdings, amounting to Rs. 80,000 , and of the water cess levied in the Tando Bago dehs referred to in the last report, amounting to Rs, 4,000. Both of these items are credited to the Public Works Department.

## 6.-Miscellaneous Government Revenue as shown in the Ta'lebands.

## (Column 16 of Appendix I.)

The district figures under this head, specially those for the Sukkur, Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts, show marked fluctuations, though the net result for the province amounts to a decrease of only Rs. 29,000 on last year's total of a little over 7 lákhs. In the first named district the greater part of the increase of Rs. 51,000 occurs in the Shikárpur Táluka where large sums were realized by the sale of unoccupied lands and of the right to remove jungle growth from lands under command of the new Choi Canal. The decrease in the other two districts has been caused chiefly by (1) a falling off in the realizations from the sale of occupancies principally on the Jamrao Canal and (2) a contraction in the area cultivated unauthorisedly, the assessment and fines leviabie on which are credited to this head.

## 7.-Remissions.

(Column 20 of Appendix I.)
The total amount of land revenue remitted during the year was Rs. 5,93,000, as compared with Rs. $5,25,000$ in the previous year. Deficiency of water was the chief cause, and this accounted for more than 4 lákhs or 68 per cent. of the total. On the other hand, floods or breaches which necessitated the remission of Rs. 1,66,000 last year were responsible for only Rs. 24,000 in the year under report. Remissions granted on time-expired fallow numbers were also comparatively small amounting to Rs. 34,000 only as against a little over a lákh in the past year, the reason for the falling off being that owing to the unfavourable inundation, the jear 1907-1908 was ordered by the Commissioner to be omitted from the calculation of the fallow period. The great contraction of cultivation on the Jámráo naturally caused a decrease in the amount of remission granted to colonists under the terms of their grants, the figure being Rs. 17,000 against Rs. 67,500 in the previous year. Remission due to damage to crops from locusts and other insects and to loss caused by frost amounted this year to Rs. 29,000 and Rs. 11,000 respectively against Rs. 39,000 and Rs. 5,000 in 1906-1907.

## 8.-Suspensions.

## (Column 33 of Appendix I.)

Suspensions are seldom granted in Sind with reference to whole tracts, but postponements of recovery of revenue are granted in the case of individual holdings when good cause can be shown for the same. The amount of land revenue under postponement at the end of the year was Rs. 4,96,000, of which Rs. $2,32,000$ belong to the year under report and Rs. $2,04,00 \mathrm{~J}$ to previous years. As these figures are included in the balances outstanding at the close of the year, they will be dealt with in paragraph 11 below.

## 9.-Revenue for collection. <br> (Column 21 of Appendix I.)

As a natural result of the poor inundation, there is a considerable falling off in the net demand of land revenue which stood at $89 \frac{1}{2}$ lákhs or $20 \frac{1}{2}$ lákhs less than in 1906-1907. Adding the previous year's balances, the amount for collection was Rs. $98,16,000$ against Rs. $1,17,19,000$, the corresponding figure for the previous year.

## 10.-Collections.

## (Columin 32 of Appendix I.)

The total collections of the current year's revenue amounted to Rs. $84,28,000$ out of a total demand of Rs. $89,55,000$ or $94 \cdot 11$ per cent., against 95 per cent., in the past year, while the percentage of the recoveries of past years' arrears (46.5) was actually a little higher than that for 1906-1907 (45.9). Considering the unfavourable character of the year, these results are obviously satisfactory, the more so because, as will be noticed from paragraph 15 below, the number of coercive processes employed in effectiug the recoveries was smaller than in the previous year. The high prices of graia which ruled throughout the year. no doubt greatly facilitated the task of collection. Under Government Resolution No. 5420, dated 2nd August 1890, the collections of land revenue, including miscellaneous items not brought to account in the jamábandi, are to be compared with the collections shown in the Accountant General's books. The difference amounts to Rs. 18,406 and is explained in Statement A. An excess of Rs. 29,949 in the Accountant General's figure is due to (1) over collections, (2) collections on account of future years and (3) inclusion of recoveries on account of boundary marks which were not brought to account in the jamábandi of the year. On the other hand, the figures in Jamábandi Return No. 1 show an excess of Rs. 11,543, of which Rs. 11,124 represent adjustments of errors in accounts, and Rs. 419 represent collections made during the preceding year.

## 11.-Balances.

## (Columns 33-37 of Appendix I and Appendix II.)

The total outstanding balances at the close of the year, including the past year's arrears amounted to Rs. $9,87,276$ against Rs. $9,50,939$ in the preceding year. Deducting the amounts which were remitted or written off after the close of the year, the balances are reduced to Rs. $9,08,426$ or only Rs. 47,000 more than the corresponding figure for 1906-1907. Of this, Rs. 33,736 have been collected since the close of the year, leaving the unrecovered balance at Rs. $8,74,691$, Rs. 4,28,269 belonging to the year under report and Rs. 4,46,422 to previous years. Out of the total unrecovered balance just referred to, (a) Rs. 4,47,645 are under postponement granted by competent authority, of which Rs. 2,436 in the Lárkána District are the subject of correspondence with a view to remission, (b) Rs. 16,291 are the subject of correspondence for postponement, (c) Rs. 1,08,119 are due from the Manager, Incumbered Estates in Sind, (d) Rus. 2,45,368 are under process for recovery, (e) the remaiuing Rs. 57,267 are mostly due on account of occupancy fees recoverable in future years. Except under (a), the above figures compare favourably with those of в 526-19
the preceding year. Most of the increase under head (a) occurs in the Hyderabad, Thar and Párkar and Karáchi Districts. In the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts it was found necessary to accord liberal treatment to the zamindirs in the matter of granting postponements; while, in the Karáchi District, the widespread damage caused by floods in July 1908, just before the last instalment fell due, necessitated the suspension of all measures for the collection of revenue in the tracts affected. The progress in the recovery of past years' arrears in the Upper Sind Frontier District was satisfactory, considering the character of the season.

As required by Government Resolution No. 5140, dated 22nd July 1890, the previous years' balances, which were shown as recoverable in Appendix II and which were not recovered in the year under report, have to be separately accounted for. Such balances amounted to Rs. 4,55,747. Of this amount Rs. 9,325 were recovered after the close of the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 4,46,422, which is accounted for in a separate Statement B.

## 12.-Taka'vi Advances.

## (Appendix III.)

Details of taḱvi advances under Acts XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884 are given in Appendix III. The total amount advanced is Rs. 3,09,705 under the Land Improvement Loans Act and Rs. 3,15,541 under the Agriculturists Loans Act against Rs. 2,78,101 and Rs. 2,34,017 respectively. The increase occurs chiefly in the Lárkána, Hyderabad and Karáchi Districts and is mainly to be ascribed to the excellent inundation of the current year 1908-1909, field operations in connection with which were of course commenced at the end of the year under report. In the Karáchi District an extraordinary demand for takári arose out of the flonds referred to in the preceding paragraph. Tbe loans under the Land Improvement Loans Act were mostly granted for the construction of wells and clearance of karias, and those under the Agriculturists Loans Act for the purchase of seed and cattle.

Out of the total amount of advances which stood unrecovered at the beginning of the year under report, viz., Rs. 22,14,731, a sum of Rs. 5,07,554 was collected and Rs. 2,724 were remitted during the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 17,04,453. This sum includes Rs. 13,41,851 which are due for collection in 1908-1909 and subsequent years. The remainder Rs. $3,62,601$ is composed of Rs. 1,82,719 on account of arrears of previous years and Rs. 1,79,883 which are due within the year under report. Of the former, Rs. 6,525 have been recovered and Rs. 100 have been remitted since the beginning of the year. Statement $O$ shows how the remaining arrears are accounted for. The information required by paragraph 5 of Government of India's No. 2155-321-7, dated 3 rd October 1901, regarding the amount of agricultural loan business is embodied in Statement D.

## 13,-Area.

## (Apperdix IV.)

The slight increase of 610,000 acres (or 15 square miles) in the area of the province (column 3) calls for no explanation. The net increase of 112,000 acres in the figures of column 4, and the decrease of 185,000. acres appearing under the head uncultivable land (column 5) are the result chiefly of (a) the rectification of the error in the accounts of the Rohri Táluka in the Sukkur District, referred to in paragraph 3 above and (b) survey operations conducted in the Hyderabad District, in the course of which an area of about 70,000 acres which had previously belonged to the head 'unassessed cultivable' was classed as 'uncultivable.' The following table exhibits the areas taken up and relinquished in each distrint durine the voar undar ranntrt-

The area taken up bas fallen off by 30 per cent. The decrease has occurred in all districts except Upper Sind Frontier and is most marked in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts. Part of it must be attributed to the unsatisfactory character of the inundation, but, in the two districts just named, it is also due to the fact that there is now very little land available for grant on the new canals. In the Hyderabad District, further, the desirability of restricting grants of land, as affecting the financial prospects of the projected Indus Left Bank Canal, has been generally kept in vier. The extent to which this policy of curtailing grants in the districts to be affected by the projected perennial canals is to be followed has formed the subject of a separate report, which is now under the consideration of Government. The increase in the Upper Sind Frontier District is due to a larger area than in the past year having been taken up on Begári Canal, consequent on the removal during the year in certain tracts watered by this canal of the restriction on the grant of land previously in force.

The area relinquished shows an increase of 6,000 acres. Almost all of it occurs in the Colonization area in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts. The area appearing against the Upper Sind Frontier District consists largely of lands resigned in excliange for new lands. The information required by Government Resolution No. 8294, dated 20th November 1899, is given in the subjoined statement :-


The difference of 26,944 acres between the total of the areas accounted for in this statement and the total given in column 5 of the preceding statement represents the area of fallow-forfeited and relinquished land restored to the
original occupants on the payment of arrears or otherwise. Of the total area granted free of malkano, 8,000 acres wore given on the Jumrao as peasant grants. The remaining area is composed of petty grants made in lieu of lands relinquished or in consideration of frontage claims. The aggregate realizations from malkano are smaller than in the previous year, but the average rate per acre is higher, being Rs. 3-1-0 against Rs. 2-14-0 in 1906-07.

## 14.-Average Incidence of Land Revenue.

## (Appendix $V$.)

There has been a fall in the average incidence of land revenue per head of population and per acre (columns 19, 32 and 36 ) owing to the unfavourable inundation. The slight increase of 2 pies in column 31 calls for no remark.

## 15.-Coercive Processes. <br> (Appendix VI.)

There is a slight increase in the number of notices issued in the Upper Sind, Lárkána and Karáchi Districts but it is more than counterbalanced by the decrease observable in the remaining three districts, and the net result is a falling off of nearly 4,000 notices on the provincial totals. There is likewise a decrease in the more severe forms of processes. A most noticeable thing is the continued absence of resort to section 148 of the Land Revenue Code in the Fyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts, and the attention of the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners is being drawn to this matter.

As usual the forfeitures shown in the statement are mostly those carried out under the Sind Fallow Rules.

## 16.-Miscellaneous Revenue not included in the Talebands.

The revenue under this head amounted to Rs. 72,645 against Rs. 73,637 in the preceding year. The decrease is due to a falling off in the receipts under the head "Interest on loans under the Land Improvement and Agriculturists Loans Acts."

Submitting the Land Revenue Administration Reports, Part I, of their respective charges for the year 1907-08.

Resolution.-The jamabandi returns for 1907.08 afford ample evidence of the unfavourable nature of the season. Tae total demsnd in the Presidency proper smounted to 307 lákhs for the current year and $90 \frac{1}{2}$ lákhs on acoount of suspended revenue and arrears of previous years. The automatio operation of the remission rules, combined with other causes, reduced the iatier figare by 24 lakhs, so that the final demand was 373 z lákhs. Of this sum, only $2 j 8 \frac{1}{3}$ láklis had been realised by the end of the year, 91 lákhs were suspended, and the unauthorised arrears amounted to the lakis. The latte: figure exoseds that of the previous year by $1 \frac{1}{4}$ lakh only. In the Southern Division the total balance outstanding at the end of the year ras less by $6 \frac{1}{2}$ lákhs than at the en / of the previous year; but in the other two Divisions, the only district in which a reduction ( $\ddagger$ lákhs) was effected was Sátára, which suffered less than other districts from the vagaries of the rainfall : the inoreases in the remaining distriots operated to swell the total of authorised and unauthorised arrears to 115 lákhs. The balances of unsuspended arrears are still disproportionately large in several districts. (e.g., Ahmednagar and Poona), and the Governo: in Council trusts that every effort will be made to reduce them. Ab ub 20 lákhs of the balance are reported to be irrecsverable, while of a further $12 \frac{3}{4}$ lákhs the recovery is doubtful. It is very desirable that such sums should not continue to be shown in the accounts any longer than may be necessary to verify the propriety of writing them off.

2 In Sind the iow inandation resulted in a contrastion in the cultivated area of more than six lakhs of acres and in the revenue demand of aooit 20 lakhs of rupees. The total for collection, including outstandinys on acsount of previous years, was 98 lakks, and of this or lakhs had been collected before the close of the year. The Governor in Council concurs in the opinion expressed by the Commissioner in Sind that considering the unfarourabls cbaracter of the year, the figures are satisfactorg. 'Cie oucstanding balancs of $9 \frac{3}{4}$ lákhs was very little i: excess of that of the previous year, ishile there Was an actual reduction of nearly two lákhs in the unauthorised arrears. iha attention of the Commissioner in Sind has already been drawn to the undesirability of allowing the estates under Government management to fall into arrears with their payments of land revenue. The amount due from the Manager, Incumbered Estates, though less than at the close of the preceding year, was still more than a lákh of rupees.
3. In a year of partial orop failure such as that under review, the figure of the final demand on acoount of land revenue depends verg largoly on the anna valuations made by the district oficees, and the propartion bo:ne by realisations to that demand affords a fair means for estimating tie accuracy Rev 2810
of those valuations. The combined figures for the whole Presidenoy show that at the olose of the year there was an actual decrease in the total amount of unauthorised arrears as compared with the figures of the previous year. That this result was obtained without any undue pressure is shown by the figures given in Appendix VI, whioh indieate that only in the most clearly proved cases of contumacy was use made of the powers under sections $148,153,154,155$ and 157 of the Land Revenue Code. There was also a very large decrease in the number of nitices issued, in acoordance with the principle, which has the approval of the Governor in Council, that suah notioes should not be issued in cases where there is no intention of enforoing collections by resort to severer measures. The Governor in Council has no hesitation in according his appreciation of the careful and sympathetic manner in whioh the district officers made their anna valuations, ensuring thereby the satisfaotory working of the Suspension and Remission Rules.
4. The figures for tagaivi advances and recoveries are further evidence of the liberal treatment granted to the rayats. Over 32 lákhs were advanoed during the year, while collections of principal amountel to $21 \frac{1}{2}$ lakks only. The interest recovered on a total outstanding balance, which varied from 144 lákhs at the beginning to 156 lakhs at the end of the year, was only $4 \frac{1}{2}$ lákhs, a sum less by more than half a lákh than the $3 \frac{1}{2}$ por cent., whioh represents the minimum at whioh Government oan, if the cost of distribution and colleotion be omitted from consideration, maka advances without aotual financial loss. Besides this, sums aggregating more than halt a lákh were remitted and written off as irrecoverable during the year. In the Konkan districts, Surat, Broach and East Khándesh, recoveries, espeoially under the Land Improvement Joans Act, were satisfactory ; but elsewhere as in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Sholapur, the colleotions amounted to little more than 10 per cent. of the demand. While recognising that lenienoy was nevessitated by the prevalence of unfavourable agricultural conditions, the Governor in Council considers that in some cases larger recoveries might have been made of instalments due unier the Land Improvement Loans Ac:. These loans are in most cases grant ed for the construstion of wells, the benefit of which is especially fult in years of soanty rainfall and high prices. He desires once more to impress on officers the importance of not alluwing to become prevalent any idea that default in the payment of tagávi will lead to ultimate remission. The present favourable season should áfford an opportunity for the collection of a large proportion of the arrears.
