# Report on the Administration of Criminal and Civil Justice in the Province of Sind for the year 1927.

#### PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

The area of the territories to which the statements relate is 46,506 square miles, and the population 3,279,377 according to the census of 1921.

- 2. The Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind was presided over by Mr. P. E. Percival, C.I.E., I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1927.
- 3. The following were the Additional Judicial Commissioners:—
  - (1) Mr. A. H. S. Aston, Bar.-at-Law, from 15th February to 31st December 1927.
  - (2) Mr. Rupchand Bilaram, LL.B., from 1st January to 31st December 1927.
  - (3) Dr. F. X. DeSouza, M.A., LL.D. (Cantab.), Bar.-at-Law, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1927.
  - (4) Mr. C. M. Lobo, LL.B., from 1st January to 20th June 1927.
  - (5) Mr. Faiz B. Tyabji, Bar.-at-Law, from 1st January to 14th February 1927.
- 4. The Judicial Commissioner's Court was closed for the annual vacation from 9th May to 8th June 1927.
  - 5. There were on 31st December 1927—
    - 3 Sessions Judges.
    - 4 Additional Sessions Judges and 2 First Class Sub-Judges invested with Assistant Sessions Judge's powers.
    - 7 District Magistrates.
    - 14 Sub-Divisional Magistrates.
    - 15 City and Resident Magistrates.
    - 233 Other 1st, 2nd and 3rd class Magistrates, of whom 91 were Special and Honorary Magistrates.

Besides the above there were 34 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of those in the City of Karachi, constituted from among 195 Honorary Magistrates.

- 6. There were on the 31st December 1927-
  - 3 District Judges.
  - 4 Assistant Judges.
  - 2 Small Cause Court Judges (including the Registrar, Small Cause Court, Karachi).
  - 4 First Class Sub-Judges.
  - 11 Second Class Sub-Judges.
- 7. The annual cold-weather tour for the inspection of the Courts in Sind was not made in the year under report on account of the Sessions Case commonly known as the "Karachi Coinage Case" which occupied 44 working days and of the arrears in the Court.
- 8. The District Judge, Hyderabad, inspected the Subordinate Courts of Tando Muhammad Khan and Mirpurkhas.
- 9. The temporary appointment of a fifth Judge in the Judicial Commissioner's Court, which was created by Government with effect from 21st June 1923, terminated on 20th June 1927.
- 10. The Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act is reported to be working fairly satisfactorily in the Province.
- The total receipts of all the Courts are, according to the figures supplied by the Accountant-General, Rs. 10,92,761 and the total charges Rs. 14,17,974 during the year under report, disclosing a deficit of Rs. 3,25,213. The deficit, as in 1925 and in 1926 is mainly due to the fact that the cost of the new Judicial Court buildings at Karachi is debited against receipts. There is bound to be such deficit until these new Judicial buildings, which are estimated to cost 33 lakhs, are completed; they are expected to be completed and ready for occupation at the end of 1928. In the year under report, of the total charges, Rs. 3,33,265 is for "Buildings—Original Works" in the Karachi district.

#### CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

12. The number of offences reported and those returned as true during the year under review are 33,942 and 32,306, respectively, and show a decrease of 403 and 496 as compared with the figures of the preceding year, which are 34,345 and 32,802, respectively.

13. There was a corresponding decrease in the number of cases brought to trial from 34,132 to 33,484 and in the number of persons under trial from 54,731 to 54,004. The number of persons remaining under trial at the end of the year under report fell from 6,154 to 6,110. The total number of persons under trial during the year under review before the several Criminal Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner, was 54,450.

The fines in 1927 amounted to Rs. 2,54,620-15-4 as against Rs. 2,57,289-12-3 and compensation paid to accused persons in 1927 amounted to Rs. 8,969-3-4 as against Rs. 11,121-12-0 in 1926.

15. Particulars as to the results of trials in the different districts (including the persons in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind) are given in Appendix A.

The excess of acquittals or discharges over convictions is due to the fact that a large number of cases were compounded or withdrawn.

- 16. The work done by the several Sessions Courts (including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind) for the last three years is shown in Appendix B.
- 17. The number of offences affecting life and attempts at such offences rose from 241 to 274 in the year under report.
- 13. There was an increase in the number of offences reported under the following heads:—

- 19. The number of individual appeals disposed of in the year under report was 2,637, that is, 108 more than in the preceding year. Out of these the sentences were left unaltered in 2,051 cases and were reversed or varied in 503. The sentences were maintained intact in 77.78 per cent of appeals against 70.03 in the previous year.

The Criminal Appeals in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner show a decrease of 26, and the Sessions Courts and the Courts of the Magistrates show an increase of 61 and 60, respectively.

20. During the year under report, cases of 197 persons were examined in revision by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction). The Sessions Courts examined the cases of 157 and the District Magistrates 31. The principal results of this revision were that sentences of 34 persons were reversed, of 12 persons altered and of 191 persons were otherwise disposed of.

21. The Criminal work disposed of by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction) in the year under report as compared with that of 1926 and the arrears at the end of the year is shown in Appendix C.

The cases of 48 persons were referred to the Court of the Judicial Commissioner for confirmation of the sentence of death. In the case of 33, the sentence of death was confirmed; in the case of 6 it was commuted to that of transportation for life; in the case of 3 the convictions and sentences were reversed and the accused acquitted; and the cases of 6 persons were pending at the close of the year.

#### CIVIL JUSTICE.

22. The total number of Civil suits instituted in Sind during the year under report was 34,418 as compared with 30,226 in 1926. The number in each of the District Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (District Court Judisdiction), filed in the two years was—

- 26. The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 9,486 as against 8,727 in the previous year. In the Judicial Commissioner's Court the number pending was 922 as against 1,078.
- 27. The average duration of contested and uncontested suits in the District Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (District Court Jurisdiction), was 310'01 and 166'11 days, respectively, in the year under report as against 310'58 and 301'95 days, respectively, in 1926.
- 28. The number of Miscellaneous Judicial cases for disposal before the Courts was 2,049 as against 2,683 in 1926. The number disposed of was 1,499 as against 2,236 in 1926.
- 29. The number of Civil Appeals before the District Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (District Court Jurisdiction), was 808 as against 867 in 1926. Of these 453 were disposed of as compared with 398 in 1926. The number of Civil Appeals disposed of during the year under report as contrasted with the preceding year is as follows:—

30. The average duration of appeals in the District Courts during the year under report was 496.67 days and in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner (District Court Jurisdiction) 365 and

(High Court Jurisdiction) 580'04. The corresponding figures for the year 1926 were 371'19, 243'33 and 469'29, respectively.

- 31. There were in all 27,241 applications for execution before the Civil Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind, as against 24,437 in 1926. Of these 23,015 were disposed of as against 20,559 in 1926. The amount realized in execution of decrees during the year under report was Rs. 16,39,959-0-4 as compared with Rs. 6,43,756 2-0 in the year 1926. Moveable property was sold in 135 cases as against 185 in 1926, and attached but subsequently released in 281 as against 355 in 1926.
- 32. 287 Insolvency petitions were presented during the year as against 282 in 1926. Out of 432 petitions for disposal before the Courts in the Province of Sind, 316 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 116. The number of insolvents discharged was 102 as against 97 in 1926. The orders of adjudication in respect of 31 debtors were annulled in the Judicial Commissioner's Court. The number of undischarged insolvents in the said Court increased from 244 to 299.
- 33. There were no references made under section 27 or any appeals filed under section 30 of the Workmen's Compensation Act, VIII of 1923, during the year under review.
- 34. At the opening of the year, 5 applications for leave to appeal to the Privy Council were pending orders in the Judicial Commissioner's Court. Three new applications were filed during the year making a total of 8. Of these, 1 was withdrawn and in 2 certificates were granted but eventually they were revoked and the applications struck off, as the applicants failed to give the required security within the time allowed by law. Five applications were pending at the close of the year.
- 35. Appendix D shows the Civil work disposed of by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner (High Court Jurisdiction) during the year under report as contrasted with that of 1926 and the arrears awaiting disposal.

#### GENERAL.

36. The arrears of work, particularly Civil Appellate and Original, in the Judicial Commissioner's Court are still very heavy. Government on account of financial stringency were unable to extend the period of the temporary appointment of the fifth Judge

beyond 20th June 1927. But to relieve the Court of some of the petty civil work a special bill for the establishment of a Court of Small Causes at Karachi with higher pecuniary jurisdiction than at present is before the Government. A proposal is also under the consideration of Government to transfer the mofussil work of the Karachi district outside the Karachi taluka to the Hyderabad Judicial district, which proposal, if given effect to, will further relieve the Judicial Commissioner's Court to some extent.

- 37. Government owing to financial stringency have also not been able to establish a Chief Court for Sind, though the Sind Courts Act was passed in 1926. For the same reason the creation of the new Judicial district of Nawabshah has been postponed.
- 38. To effect improvement in the administration of civil justice in the four desert talukas of Mithi, Chachro, Diplo and Nagar Parkar in the Thar Parkar district by bringing justice nearer home to the poorer class of agriculturists-defendants, the "linked" Sub-Court at Mithi, which was established in June 1923 but had not proved a success, has been abolished; the talukas have been included within the limits of the jurisdiction of the Sub-Court of Mirpurkhas in the said district and the Mukhtiarkars of those talukas have been appointed Joint Sub-Judges to try suits, which do not exceed Rs. 250 in value, arising within their talukas and empowered to hold their Courts at their respective headquarters, with effect from 1st October 1927.


