# Report on the Administration of Criminal and Civil Justice in the Province of Sind for the year 1923.

#### PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

The area of the territories to which the statements relate is 46,506 square miles, and the population 3,279,377, according to the census of 1921.

- 2. The Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind was presided over by Mr. C. A. Kincaid, C.V.O., I.C.S., from 1st January to 7th March 1923, by Mr. B. C. Kennedy, I.C.S., from 8th March to 13th November 1923 and again by Mr. C. A. Kincaid, C.V.O., I.C.S., from 14th November to 31st December 1923.
  - 3. The following were the Additional Judicial Commissioners:-
  - Mr. G. D. Madgavkar, I.C.S., from 1st January to 13th November 1923.
    - Mr B. C. Kennedy, I.C.S., from 14th November to 31st December 1923.
    - Mr. A. H. S. Aston, Bar.-at-Law, from 1st January to 20th March and again from 18th June to 31st December 1923.
    - Mr. N. W. Kemp, Bar.-at-Law, from 21st March to 17th June 1923.
  - Mr. E. Raymond, LL.B., from 1st January to 31st December 1923.
  - Mr. Rupchand Bilaram, LL.B., from 21st June to 31st December 1923.
- 4. The Judicial Commissioner's Court was closed for the annual vacation from the 21st May to the 20th June 1923.
  - 5. There were on the 31st December 1923-
    - 3 Sessions Judges.
    - 2 Additional Sessions Judges.
    - 2 1st class, Sub-Judges invested with Assistant Sessions Judge's powers.
    - 7 District Magistrates.
    - 15 Sub-Divisional Magistrates.
    - 13 City and Resident Magistrat s.
    - 147 Other 1st, 2nd and 3rd class Magistrates.

Besides the above, there were 296 Special and Honorary Magistrates.

  - 3 Small Cause Court Judges (including the Cantonment Magistrate, Karachi, exercising the powers of a Judge of a Small Cause Court, and the Registrar, Small Cause Court, Karachi).
  - 3 1st class Sub-Judges.
  - 13 2nd class, Sub-Judges.
- 7. The Judicial Commissioner went on tour to make the annual inspection of the Courts in Sind and he inspected the District and Sessions Courts and the 1st class Sub-Courts of Sukkur and Larkana, the 2nd class Sub-Courts of Sehwan, Shikarpur and Jacobabad, the City Magistrates' Courts of Sukkur and Shikarpur, the Resident Magistrate's Court of Larkana, the 1st class Magistrates' Courts of Sehwan, Sukkur, Shikarpur, Jacobabad and Nawabshah, and the 2nd class Magistrate's Court of Jacobabad.
- 8. The District Judge, Hyderabad, inspected the Sub-Courts of Naushahro, Shahdadpur and Tando Mahomed Khan and the District Judge, Larkana, those of Mehar and Sehwan.
- 9. A Judicial Conference was held during the year under report by the District Judge, Hyderabad.
- 10. The heavy increase in, and arrears of, work in the Judicial Commissioner's Court, necessitated the temporary appointment of a 5th Judge. The appointment which was created by Government in the first instance for a period of six months with effect from the 21st June 1923, was sanctioned for a further period of six months under Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 3041-II, dated the 16th November 1923.
- 11. The Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act is reported to be working satisfactorily in the Province.
- 12. The total receipts of all the Courts are, according to the figures supplied by the Accountant-General, Rs. 12,47,052 and the total charges Rs. 10,73,421 during the year under report disclosing an excess of Rs. 1,73,631 in the receipts over charges.

### CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

13. The number of offences reported and those returned as true during the year under review shows an increase as compared with the preceding year, the figures being:—

14. There was a corresponding increase in the number of cases brought to trial from 29,077 to 32,978 and in the number of persons from 49,988 to 52,278. The number of persons remaining under trial at the end of the year under report rose from 5,788 to 6,131. The total number of persons under trial during the year under review before the several Criminal Courts including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner was 52,926.

20. The number of individual appeals disposed of in the year under report was 1,682, that is 307 less than in the preceding year. Out of these sentences were left unaltered in 1,363 cases and were

reversed or varied in 297. The sentences were maintained intact in 81'03 per cent. of appeals against 79'24 in the previous year.

The Criminal Appeals in the Magistrates' Courts and the Sessions Courts show a decrease of 76 and 241, respectively, and those in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner show an increase of 10.

- 21. During the year under report, cases of 137 persons were examined in revision by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction). The Sessions Courts examined the cases of 178 and the District Magistrates 68. The principal results of this revision were that sentences of 17 persons were reversed, of 6 persons altered and of 111 persons were otherwise disposed of.
- 22. The following table shows the Criminal work diposed of by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction) in the year under report as compared with that of 1922 and the arrears at the end of the year:—

The cases of 20 persons were referred to the Court of the Judicial Commissioner for confirmation of the sentence of death. In the cases of 15, the sentence of death was confirmed; in the case of 2, the conviction and sentence was reversed; in the case of 1, the sentence was commuted to that of transportation for life and the cases of 2 persons were pending at the close of the year. The cases of 11 persons were referred to the Court of the Judicial Commissioner under section 307, Criminal Procedure Code, of whom 1 was sentenced to transportation for life, 2 were acquitted and discharged and the rest sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.

23. The Criminal Procedure Code, as amended by Acts XII, XVIII and XXXVII of 1923, came into force with effect from 1st September 1923. As regards the effect of the amendments in the mofussil nothing of importance has been noticed. The interval, however, has been too short to form a definite opinion about the changes made. The effects of the change in the constitution of this Court apparently introduced by accident by the New Code are far reaching and deleterious and the Judicial Commissioner proposes to submit a special report on the matter before long.

### CIVIL JUSTICE.

24. The total number of Civil Suits instituted in Sind during the year under report was 28,452 as compared with 27,545 in 1922. The number in each of the District Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (District Court Jurisdiction), filed in the two years was:—

- 32. The average duration of appeals in the District Courts during the year under report was 461.59 days and in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner (District Court Jurisdiction) 252.1 and (High Court Jurisdiction) 671.18. The corresponding figures for the year 1922 were 409.5, 60.0 and 865.18.
- 33. There were in all 21,705 applications for execution before the Civil Courts including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind as against 20,151 in 1922. Of these 18,516 were disposed of as against 17,203 in 1922. The amount realized in execution of decrees during the year under report was Rs. 5,30,625-4-7 as compared with Rs. 3,48,570-12-3 in the year 1922. Moveable property was sold in 130 cases as against 115 in 1922, and attached but subsequently released in 228 as against 248 in 1922.
- 34. 237 Insolvency petitions were presented during the year. Out of 342 petitions for disposal before the Courts in the Province of Sind, 210 were disposed A leaving a balance of 132. The number of insolvents discharged was 27 as against 12 in 1922. The orders of adjudication in respect of 6 debtors were annulled in the Judicial Commissioner's Court. The number of undischarged insolvents in the said Court has risen from 127 to 235.
