# Report on the Administration of Criminal and Civil Justice in the Province of Sind for the year 1924.

#### PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

The area of the territories to which the statements relate is 46,506 square miles, and the population 3,279,377 according to the census of 1921.

- 2. The Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind was presided over by Mr. C. A. Kincaid, C.V.O., I C.S., from 1st January to 28th May 1924 and by Mr. B. C. Kennedy, I.C.S., from 29th May to 31st December 1924.
  - 3. The following were the Additional Judicial Commissioners:—
    - Mr. B. C. Kennedy, I.C.S., from 1st January to 28th May 1924.
    - Mr. E. Raymond, LL.B., from 1st January to 12th February 1924 and from 24th July to 31st December 1924.

    - Mr. Rupchand Bilaram, LL.B., from 1st January to 31st December 1924.
    - Mr. C. M. Lobo, LL.B., from 13th February to 23rd July 1924.
    - Mr. G. D. Madgavkar, I.C.S., from 29th May to 10th September 1924.
    - Mr. P. E. Percival, C.I.E., Bar.-at-Law, I.C.S., from 11th September to 25th December 1924.
- 4. The Judicial Commissioner's Court was closed for the annual vacation from 15th May to 14th June 1924.

Besides the above, there were 258 Special and Honorary Magistrates.

- 7. The annual cold-weather tour for the inspection of the courts in Sind was made in February-March 1925 by Dr. F. X. DeSouza, Civilian Additional Judicial Commissioner, who was deputed by the Judicial Commissioner for the purpose. He inspected the District and Sessions Courts of Hyderabad and Sukkur and the First Class Sub-Courts of Hyderabad, Sukkur and Shikarpur, the City Magistrates' and the First Class Magistrates' Courts of Hyderabad, Sukkur and Shikarpur.
- 8. The District Judge, Hyderabad, inspected the Sub-Courts of Mirpurkhas, Tando Mahomed Khan and Naushahro, the District Judge, Sukkur, those of Rohri, Shikarpur and Jacobabad and the District Judge, Larkana, those of Mehar and Sehwan.
- 9. The temporary appointment of a fifth Judge in the Judicial Commissioner's Court, which was created by Government with effect from the 21st June 1923 has been sanctioned for a further period upto the 20th June 1926, under Home Department No. 7328-A, dated 17th June 1925.
- 10. The Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act is reported to be working satisfactorily in the Province.
- 11. The total receipts of all the Courts are, according to the figures supplied by the Accountant-General, Rs. 10,66,505 and the total charges Rs. 13,60,009 during the year under report, disclosing a deficit of Rs. 2.93,504 in the receipts over charges.

#### CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

12. The number of offences reported and those returned as true during the year under review shows a decrease as compared with the preceding year, the figures being—

13. There was a corresponding decrease in the number of cases brought to trial from 32,978 to 32,373 and in the number of persons from 52,278 to 52,229. The number of persons remaining under trial at the end of the year under report rose from 6,131 to 6,144. The total number of persons under trial during the year under review before the several Criminal Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner, was 52,484.

- 17. The number of offences affecting life and attempts at such offences rose from 275 to 303 in the year under report. A large portion of this class of crime, specially in Karachi, Hyderabad, Nawabshah, Larkana, Sukkur and Upper Sind Frontier, arose from intrigues or supposed intrigues with women.
- 18. There was an increase in the number of offences under the following heads:—

- (13) Criminal trespass.

- (17) Offences under special and local laws.
- (18) Offences affecting the public health, safety, convenience, decency and morals.
- 19. The mumber of individual appeals disposed of in the year under report was 1794, that is, 112 more than in the preceding year. Out of these the sentences were left unaltered in 1,317 cases and were reversed or varied in 452. The sentences were maintained intact in 73'41 per cent. of appeals against 81'03 in the previous year.

The above appeals were thus distributed:-

- (1) Magistrates' Courts ... 200
- (2) Sessions Courts (including Judicial Commissioner's Court).
- (3) Court of the Judicial Commissioner (High Court Jurisdiction).

The Criminal Appeals in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner and the Sessions Courts show an increase of 72 and 294, respectively, and those in the Courts of the Magistrates show a decrease of 252.

- 20. During the year under report, cases of 196 persons were examined in revision by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction). The Sessions Courts examined the cases of 239 and the District Magistrates 63. The principal results of this revision were that sentences of 36 persons were reversed, of 3 persons altered and of 141 persons were otherwise disposed of.
- 21. The following table shows the Criminal work disposed of by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court

Jurisdiction) in the year under report as compared with that of 1923 and the arrears at the end of the year:—

The cases of 31 persons were referred to the Court of the Judicial Commissioner for confirmation of the sentence of death. In the case of 13 the sentence of death was confirmed; in the case of 2 the conviction and sentence was reversed; in the case of 4 the sentence was commuted to that of transportation for life and the cases of 12 persons were pending at the close of the year.

#### CIVIL JUSTICE.

22. The total number of Civil Suits instituted in Sind during the year under report was 28,144 as compared with 28,452 in 1923. The number in each of the District Courts, including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (District Court Jurisdiction), filed in the two years was:—

- 30. The average duration of appeals in the District Courts during the year under report was 539.26 days and in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner (District Court Jurisdiction) 193 and (High Court Jurisdiction) 540.67. The corresponding figures for the year 1923 were 461.59, 252.1 and 671.18.
- 31. There were in all 21,343 applications for execution before the Civil Courts including the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind as against 21,705 in 1923. Of these 17,960 were disposed of as against 18,516 in 1923. The amount realized in execution of decrees during the year under report was Rs. 5,38,571-3-8 as compared with Rs. 5,30,625-4-7 in the year 1923. Moveable property was sold in 151 cases as against 130 cases in 1923, and attached but subsequently released in 243 as against 228 in 1923.
- 32. 233 Insolvency petitions were presented during the year Out of 365 petitions for disposal before the Courts in the Province of Sind, 168 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 197. The number of insolvents discharged was 62 as against 27 in 1923. The orders of adjudication in respect of 10 debtors were annulled in the Judicial Commissioner's Court. The number of undischarged insolvents in the said Court has fallen from 235 to 221.
- 33. There were no references made under section 27 nor any appeals filed under section 30 of the Workmen's Compensation Act, VIII of 1923, during the year under review.
- 34. The following table shows the Civil work disposed of by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner (High Court Jurisdiction) during the year under report as contrasted with that of 1923 and the arrears awaiting disposal.
