REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1903.

PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

1. The area and population of the territories to which the report relates are shown in the following table:—

- 2. During the year under report there was a slight variation in the constitution of Civil Courts in the Presidency. The Court of the Second Class Subordinate Judge of Bijápur was converted into a First Class Subordinate Judge's Court with effect from the 13th February 1908. The village of Chandviranhatti within the jurisdiction of the Gokák Court was transferred to that of Chikoli Court with effect from the 1st day of November 1908.
- 3. The High Court was presided over by the Honourable Sir Lawrence Hugh Jenkins, Knight, K.C.I.E., from 1st January 1903 to 14th March 1903. His Lordship retired on the 15th March 1903. The Honourable Mr. Justice Russell acted as Chief Justice from 15th March 1903 to 21st April 1909. The Honourable Sir Basil Scott, Knight, was appointed Chief Justice and took charge on 22nd April 1903.

Puisne Judges.

- The Honourable Mr. Justice Russell, from 1st January 1003 to 14th March 1908 and from 22nd April 1908 to 31st December 1908. His Lordship acted as Chief Justice from 15th March 1908 to 21st April 1908.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Chandavarkar, from 1st January 1908 to 18th March, 1908, from 15th April 1908 to 8th June 1908 and from 1st August 1908 to 31st December 1908. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 19th March 1908 to 14th April 1908 and on furlough from 9th June 1908 to 31st July 1909.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Batty retired on 20th January 1908 while his Lordship was on furlough.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Batchelor, from 1st January 1903 to 31 December 1908.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Davar, from 1st January 1909 to December 1908.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Beaman, from 1st January 1903 to 81 1908 and from 19th October 1908 to 31st December 1956 Lordship was on furlough from 9th June 1903 to 18th October 1908 to 18th October
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Heaton, from 17th February 1 December 1908. His Lordship, while officiating as a High Court from 1st January 1908, was on deputation charge of his office on 17th Pebruary 1908. He confirmed on 26th March 1908.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Maclcod efficiated as of the High Court from 1st January 1903 to 7th

- The Honourable Mr. Justice Knight officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 1st January 1908 to 16th February 1903 and from 9th June 1908 to 18th October 1908.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Chaubal officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 9th June 1908 to 31st July 1908.
- 4. In the Presidency Proper there were on the 31st December 1908 :--

 - 8 Small Cause Court Judges (including those at the Presidency Town) besides the Cantonment Magistrates at Belgaum and Ahmednagar who are invested with Small Cause Court powers upto certain amounts.
 - 15 First Class Subordinate Judges (excluding two Inspecting First Class Subordinate Judges who do not exercise judicial powers).
 - 88 Second Class Subordinate Judges (excluding two Inspecting Second Class Subordinate Judges who do not exercise judicial powers).
- 5. Besides the above Judicial Officers, there were during the year under report 7 Inámdárs and Jahágirdárs exercising the powers of Subordinate Judges under Regulation XIII of 1830.
- 6. In the Province of Sind there were on the 31st December 1908 besides the Judicial Commissioner—
 - 2 Additional Judicial Commissionors.
 - 3 District Judges (including a Deputy Commissioner exercising the powers of a District Judge).
 - 1 Joint Judge.
 - 1 Assistant Judge.
 - 1 Small Cause Court Judgo (besides the Cantonment Magistrate at Karachi exercising Civil powers).
 - 2 First Class Subordinato Judges.
 - 14 Second Class Subordinate Judges.
- 7. During the first month and a half of the year under report the Honourable Mr. Justice Heaton was on deputation to inspect the District and Subordinate Courts in this Presidency and the improvement noticed by his Lordship was mentioned in para. 8 of the last year's Report. In connection with this the District Judge of Shelapur in his report remarks that there has been an improvement in the work of the process serving establishment in most of the Courts and that in the First Class Subordinate Judge's Court about 90 per cent. of the processes issued were served.
 - 8. With regard to the working of the Decean Agriculturists' Relief Act, remarks made by the District Judges will be found summarized below. District Judge of Abmedabad observes that the Act has been so badly led that in cases like the one reported in 10 Bombay Law Reporter, page le Courts have actually to award more than they would have been award prior to its enactment. He believes that the Act does good in lets in which heavy interest is charged but that in Gujarát, according which Judges, the rate is moderate. The Gujaráthi Kunbis and also, he thinks, more intelligent than the Deceani agriculturists. Judge of Násik remarks that the provisions of the Act have known to the agriculturist debtors and they have begun to take led by the provisions of the Act. As an indication of this fact tree increase in the number of mortgage suits and appeals in led accounts. The most remarkable feature in the working tear noticed by the District Judge of Shelapur was the

large number of suits for redemption instituted by agriculturists in which the deed passed to the creditor was ostensibly a sale-doed. He points out, for instance, that in one táluka Court alone of that District, there were 213 redemption suits for disposal, and in 148 of these it was alleged by the plaintiff that an apparent sale-deed was in reality a deed of mortgage and that in the majority of cases the debtors' contention was upheld by the Court. The District Judge believes that the recent enactment of Section 10-A is mainly responsible for this development. The District Judge of Kánara finds from appeals decided by him and from examination of eases that the Subordinate Judges carry out the provisions of the Act properly. In the Surat District also, it is stated that the working of the Act appears satisfactory. During the year under report the conciliation system was introduced with effect from 10th September 1908 in Broach District and from 15th September 1908 in Ahmedabad District. The work of the Village Munsiffs and Conciliators in some Tálukas in Ahmedagar, Bijápur and Khándesh Districts was inspected by the respective Judges of those Districts and the work is reported to be satisfactory.

The Annual Statements.

- 9. In accordance with letter No. 1416—1448, dated the 18th September 1903, from the Government of India to the Government of Bombay, this statement is filled up in duplicate—one for Civil and the other for Criminal work—and the statistics for Revenue Courts are excluded from it, as also from the other Judicial Statements.
- 10. The total number of Civil cases decided during the year under report was 301,515 as against 309,045 in the last year, showing a decrease of 8,430. Last year also there was a decrease of 13,423. The decrease is to be noticed only in Miscellaneous Original and Appeal Cases. On the other hand there is a large increase in the number of regular suits and appeals.
- 11. Of the total number of decided cases about 44.0 per cent. were regular suits, 53.2 per cent. miscellaneous cases and 2.2 per cent. appeals, as against 41.9, 56.3 and 1.8 per cent. respectively, during the year 1007.
- 12. The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have risen from Rs. 36,49,123 to Rs. 38,49,046, and the total charges from Rs. 53,69,678 to Rs. 57,64,065. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with the Government Resolution, Judical Department, No. 5042, dated 11th August 1893.
- Statement No. VII. against 125,560 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 7,477. Last year there was a decrease of 6,918 and for several successive years there had been a gradual decrease owing to various causes, such as plague, deficient rainfall and extended application of the Decean Agriculturists' Relicf Act.
- 14. There was an increase of 3,170 in the number of suits for money as compared with the decrease of 7,117 last year. There was also an increase in all other kinds of suits except suits to establish a right of pre-emption, matrimonial suits and testamentary suits.
- 15. The percentage of suits for monoy or moveable property fell from 75.4 to 73.7 and that of suits relating to immoveable property (including mortgage and pre-emption suits) rose from 15.9 to 16.2; the percentage of all other kinds of suits together was 10.1 as compared with 8.7 last year.
- 16. The aggregate value of suits rose from Re. 4,03,46,807 to Rs. 4,57,26,170. There was a decrease of 1 in the number of suits exceeding Rs. 5,000 and not exceeding Rs. 10,000 in value, but all other kinds of suits, i.e., those not exceeding in value Rs. 10,000 in value showed an increase.
- 17. The Courts of the Unpail Tribunals and Provincial Small Cause Courts showed a decrease in the value of suits instituted during the year while the rest showed an increase.

18. There were 170,133 suits for disposal before all the Courts, out of which 134,351 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 35,782 pending at the end of the year. The corresponding figures for the last year were 164,648, 129,825 and 34,823 respectively.

- 20. Of the total number of suits disposed of after contest and on reference to arbitration, judgment was given for plaintiff in whole or in part in 85.4 per cent. and for the defendant in 14.6 per cent. of cases.
- 21. The average duration of contested suits fell from 175 days to 167 days in the year under report and of uncontested suits rose to 72 days as compared with 71 days last year. The corresponding figures for 1905 and 1906 respectively were 148 and 243 for contested and 79 and 91 for uncontested suits. In the District Courts the average duration was 226 days for contested and 117 for uncontested suits as against 307 and 116 respectively in the preceding year. In the Mosusil Subordinate Courts the average duration was 182 days for contested and 80 for uncontested suits as against 192 and 99 respectively. In the Superior Courts the average duration was 360 days for contested and 306 for uncontested suits as against 176 and 308 respectively.

^{23.} In addition to the regular suits mentioned above, the Court disposed of 20,850 miscellaneous cases as against 18,949 during the last year. The percentage of contested miscellaneous cases was about 29 and the average duration of such cases was 91 days as against 114 days in the preceding year.

^{25.} The First Class Subordinate Judges and Small Cause Court Judges invested with appellate powers disposed of 1,050 appeals as against 458 last year.

26. Of the total number of appeals decided, 1,417 were dismissed under Section 551 of the Civil Procedure Code or for default or were otherwise not prosecuted. The disposal of the remaining 4,942 appeals may be classified as under:—

- 27. The average duration of appeals was 254 days as against 232 last year.
- 28. There was a considerable decrease in the institutions as well as in the Statement No. X, Part II. disposals of miscellaneous appeals, the figures being 183 and 201 as against 519 and 429 respectively last year. The average duration of these appeals was 134 days as against 239 days in the previous year.
 - 29. As regards applications for execution the following table shows the figures for the year under report as compared with those in 1907:—

- 30. Out of the total number of applications for execution disposed of, 207 were disposed of by transfer. In 22,992 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 76,530 in part, while 89,276 proved wholly infructuous. The percentages of the last three heads of disposal were 17, 19 and 64 as compared with 16, 18 and 66 last year.
- 31. The total amount realized in execution came to Rs. 53,90,500 as against Rs. 47,38,480 last year.
- 32. The number of cases in which the judgment-debtor was imprisoned was 583 as against 569 last year, and of those in which immoveable property was sold was 3,015 as against 3,539 in the previous year.
- 33. The number of persons imprisoned in execution of decrees was 583 and the number of persons arrested but released without imprisonment was 2,060. The number of applications for declaration of insolvency was 395.
- 31. The total number of applications for declaration of insolvency disposed of during the year was 219. Of these 92 were withdrawn, 67 granted and 62 rejected.

General Remarks.

- 35. The congestion of the civil files was dealt with by the deputation of Joint First or Second Class Subordinate Judges to the following places during the whole or part of the year under report, viz., Ahmedabad, Umreth, Borsad, Kopargaon, Belgaum, Bijápur, Bágalkot, Broach, Hubli, Gadag, Kárwár, Yáwal, Poona, Málwan, Rájápur, Ratnágiri, Surat, Bulsár, Thána, Mahád and Panvel.
- 36. The First Class Subordinate Judges' of Sátára, Ahmednagar, Poona and Dhulia were empowered to assist the respective District Judges under Section 52 of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, XVII of 1879.
- 37. The District, Joint or Assistant Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmednagar, Belgaum, Broach, Kánara, Khándesh, Násik, Poona, Ratnágiri, Sátára, Sholápur and Thána inspected in all 34 Subordinate Judges' Courts during the year under report.
- 38. The District Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmednagar, Belgaum, Bijápur, Broach, Khándesh, Násik, Poona, Sátára, Surat and Thána assembled Judicial Conference of the Judges subordinate to them where points touching the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.
- 39. A departmental examination of the clerks and karkuns in the Subordinate Judicial service in Thana District was held during the year at Thana and out of 84 candidates 32 were successful.
- 40. The record room and libraries are reported by the District Judges generally to be in good order. Steps are being taken to replenish the stock of books in the Subordinate Court libraries. The destruction of useless records is carried out periodically in accordance with the rules framed by the High Court.

PRELIMINARY REMARES.

- 1. The Report relates to the Administration of Criminal Justice in all the Courts (including the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates) in the Bombay Presidency Proper and in the Province of Sind.
- 2. The area and population of the above territories are the same as these given at page 1.
- 3. In the Presidency Proper on 31st December 1908, there were, besides the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court—
 - 15 Sessions Judges.
 - 5 Additional Sessions Judges.
 - 5 Assistant Sessions Judges.
 - 19 District Magistrates.
 - 4 Presidency Magistrates.
 - 245 First Class Magistrates.

 - 165 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards, under Bombay Act I of 1889.

- 6. The total number of criminal cases disposed of in the year under report was 154,057 as compared with 155,179 in the last year, showing a decrease of 1,122. Of the total number of decided cases, 96 per cent. were original cases and 4 per cent. were appeal and revision cases. The percentages for the previous year were 95.8 and 4.2 respectively.
- 7. The total number of offences reported during the year fell from 157,996
 to 156,423. The number of cases returned as true
 was 146,163 or 93.4 per cent. of the total number of
 offences reported, the rest being cases dismissed under Section 203, Criminal
 Procedure Code, or cases in which the charge was declared to be false.
- 8. Of the total number of cases returned as true, 42 per cent. were under the Indian Penal Code and the rest under the Special and Local Laws. Cases under the Indian Penal Code related chiefly to offences of hurt, criminal force and assault, theft, mischief, criminal trespass and criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance. The principal cases under Special and Local Laws related to offences under the Breaches of Contract Act, Cantonment Act, Cattle Trespass Act, Oriminal Procedure Code, Forest Act, Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, Abkári Act, City of Bombay Police Act, District Police Act, Bombay and District Municipal Acts and Public Conveyance Act.
- 0. Among the offences returned as true, there were 5 offences against the State. There was no offence either against the Army and Navy or under the Official Secrets Act.

^{14.} In the Districts of Poons and Thána the number of offences increased by 1,174 and 1,366 respectively whereas in the Districts of Bombay, Ahmedabad, Hyderabad, Kaira, Ahmedaagar there was a decrease of 2,621, 1,300, 725, 549 and 910 respectively. ^{19.} The total number of European British subjects whose cases were disposed of during the year under report fell from 576 to 507. Of these, 152 or 30 per cent. were charged under the Penal Code, and 355 or 70 per cent. under the Special and Local Laws.

The charges under the Penal Code related chiefly to hurt, criminal force and assault, theft, cheating and criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance.

- 19. Out of the 507 persons whose cases were disposed of, 383 were convicted and 124 acquitted or discharged. The cases of 501 were disposed of by Magistrates and of 3 by the Courts of Sessions. In the case of 207 persons the deciding Magistrate was a European British subject and in the case of 297 persons he was other than a European British subject. In the case of 3 persons whose cases were disposed of by the Courts of Sessions, the Sessions Judge was a European British subject. Only one accused person claimed to be tried by mixed Jury under section 450 (2) of the Criminal Procedure Code.
- 20. There were 3,587 miscellaneous cases before the Courts involving 7,944 persons, of whom 20.2 per cent. were discharged and 66.7 per cent. convicted and the cases of about 7.1 per cent. were pending or were on dormant file.
- 21. There was a material increase in the number of persons involved in "Proceedings under Chapter VIII to prevent breach of the peace" and a material decrease in the number of persons concerned in "Proceedings against Local nuisance" and "Under Chapter XLVI, section 563."
- 22. The number of original regular cases disposed of during the year was 144,443 as against 145,306 in the last year. Of these 141,953 were disposed of by Magistrates, 1,560 by Village Officers, Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards, and 930 by Courts of Sessions and Superior Courts.
- 23. Of the total number of persons convicted, 39.4 per cent. were convicted on regular and 61.6 per cent. on summary trial. The percentages of the last year were 36.5 and 63.5 respectively.
- 24. The number of youthful offenders dealt with under section 31 of Act VIII of 1897 was 233 as against 251 in the last year.

- I have the honour to forward the Annual Statements relating to the Administration of Criminal and Civil Justice in the Province of Sind during the year 1908, together with reports and returns received from the several District Judges and District Magistrates.
- 2. During the year under report, Mr. E. M. Pratt, I. O. S., acted as Judicial Commissioner from 1st January to 23rd February 1908, and again from 1st June to 3rd October, Mr. R. Knight, I. O. S., Grom 24th February to 31st May 1908, and Mr. A. Lucas, I. O. S., from 4th October to 31st December 1908.
- Mr. H. N. Crouch, Barrister, Additional Judicial Commissioner, was on duty throughout the year except from 3rd June to 5th July 1908, when he was on privilege leave.
 - The following were the Civilian Additional Judicial Commissioners:
 - Mr. M. H. W. Hayward, I.C.S., from 1st January to 23rd February 1908, and again from 1st June to 30th September 1908. He proceeded on combined leave for 12 months from 1st October 1908.
 - He was on Special duty from 24th February to 31st May for the purpose of preparing the Sind Courts Civil and Criminal Circulars, and selected decisions of the Sind Sadar Court and was, in addition, appointed Extra Additional Judicial Commissioner from 13th March to 21st April 1903 to dispose of certain appeals, vide Government Resolutions, Judicial Department, No. 1030, dated 26th February 1908, and No. 1374, dated 13th March 1903, respectively.
 - Mr. E. M. Pratt, I. C.S., from 24th February to 31st May 1903 and again from 4th Ootober to 31st December 1908.

The following officers were in charge of the District and Sessions Court of Hyderabad:—

- Mr. Gurbamal Manghirsing was Registrar of the Court of Small Causes, Karáchi, during the whole year except from 17th February to 1st April 1908 during which period, owing to his absence on privilege leave, Mr. Thawardas Rahumal acted for him. They both exercised judicial powers.

- 38. The system of supplying copies of documents through the medium of the Value-payable Post is now being availed of to a slightly greater extent than in previous years.
- 39. As regards the working of the Dekkhan Agriculturists' Relief Act, I am of opinion that the Act has done as much harm as good. Its effect on the morality of the people has been disastrous; it has tended to enhance the rate of interest on loans and has, to some extent, hastened the transfer of land from the Mahomedan land-holder to the Banya. Where, as in Sind, we find that the rate demanded for loans well-secured by a mortgage of land approximates closely to the ordinary rate for loans on personal security only, it is evident that public confidence has been severely shaken.
